ESSEX ROADS RECEIVE A GREEN RATING FROM CENTRAL GOVERNMENT

Essex County Council has welcomed the news that the county has received a 'green' rating from the Government for its road maintenance and repair.

The rating reflects the hard work that's gone into repairing more than 5,000 miles of roads, thanks to the additional funding provided by the Department for Transport and the County Council.

The council has invested an extra £49 million, in addition to the annual highways' maintenance budget, to repair potholes and other defects since 2024. Additional funding was also secured from the Department for Transport, which has confirmed Essex County Council would receive over £168 million for road repairs until 2029/30.

The repair programme has been delivered through the Priority One programme over the last year and the ongoing Members' Highways Initiative, which have ensured thousands more additional repairs have been carried out in the last two years.

Priority One focused on proactive maintenance such as road resurfacing, vegetation clearance, white lines and replacing broken signs.

The Members' Highways Initiative gives County Councillors the opportunity to have dedicated crews carry out smaller road and pavement repairs in their divisions every few weeks, alongside £300,000 to carry out repairs caused by winter weather conditions and address concerns of local residents.

Crews are currently managing the winter service and keeping the roads safe for travellers in wintry weather. This includes driving the gritters in icy conditions and carrying out make safe repairs where the weather is causing damage.

However, larger scale resurfacing and repair works will resume in the Spring to carry out further repairs and maintain the condition of the county's roads for even longer.

MORE FUNDING FOR BUSES

Essex County Council has secured more than £68 million to support and improve local bus services across the county over the coming years.

The government funding will support initiatives to improve reliability, strengthen local connections

and encourage more people to travel by bus. It will also help ensure services remain accessible and responsive to local needs.

The government's new consolidated bus funding framework combines Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) funding with the Local Authority Bus Service Operator Grant (LA BSOG). Essex will receive £10,778,248 annually from 2026/27 to 2028/29. This totals £32,334,744.

Alongside this revenue funding, Essex County Council will receive £36.26 million in Local Authority Bus Grant capital funding between 2026 and 2030.

Essex County Council currently subsidises bus services where there is no commercial service, but there is a need to help residents stay connected. These make up around 15% of the bus services in the county.

The funding follows the government's 2025 Spending Review. In this, it was confirmed areas outside London would receive more than £1 billion a year in long-term bus funding. This includes both capital and revenue support for local transport authorities.

SAFER ESSEX ROADS PARTNERSHIP OUT IN THE MALDON DISTRICT

The Safer Essex Roads Partnership (SERP) was out last week responding directly to community concerns and known collision sites, as part of ongoing work to support Vision Zero and reduce the risk of people being killed or seriously injured on Essex roads.

The team joined forces with Maldon District Council officers during a morning of targeted enforcement across the Maldon district, focusing on areas highlighted through collision data, community concern and reports of speeding vehicles. Locations visited included Maldon town centre, Purleigh, Great Totham, Wickham Bishops, Southminster, North Fambridge and Althorne. By combining targeted enforcement with engagement and education, the SERP continues to work with communities and partners to deliver safer speeds, reduce harm and move Essex closer to Vision Zero.

ESSEX SECURES FUNDING FOR COMMUNITY DIGITAL SKILLS PROJECTS

The £375,000 grant comes from the Government's Digital Inclusion Innovation Fund. The grant was launched by the Department for Science, Innovation and Technology (DSIT).

Digital Essex - part of Essex County Council - is leading the project. The funding will be used to run a series of community-based digital skills projects with the aim of:

- developing a national methodology to measure the benefits of helping people use digital apps
- showing how digital inclusion can improve lives and reduce inequalities

The focus will be on three priority groups:

- older adults (65+)
- young people not in education, employment or training (NEETs)
- individuals with learning or physical disabilities

SOCIAL BROADBAND TARIFFS

At a time when living costs are reaching record highs, several broadband providers are offering special discounted deals to help people receiving benefits to stay connected.

If you're a low-income family receiving Universal Credit or other benefits, you could be eligible for a social broadband tariff and save up to £202 a year on your broadband bills.

Who's eligible for a broadband social tariff?

If you receive one of the following benefits, you may be eligible for a social tariff:

- Universal Credit
- Pension Credit
- Employment and Support Allowance
- Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income Support

BUS TIMETABLE CHANGE DATES SET

As part of the Enhanced Partnership between Essex County Council and Local Bus Operators a set of Common Registration Dates has been agreed each year for new registrations, variations and cancellations.

These change dates align with the Essex County Council Academic Calendar and will allow better co-ordination when updating roadside printed publicity. It will also limit the number of times a particular bus corridor can change in quick succession.
